I wanted to take a moment to reflect on recent developments and share some updates with you.

Windows 10's end of life looms

The official end-of-support date for Windows 10 is October 14, 2025. After this date, Microsoft will no longer provide security updates or technical assistance for the operating system. To assist in preparation, the August presentation will discuss possible options. We will also touch on the latest Windows 11 update fails. There are some reports of the July update either failing completely (not even reaching the re-boot phase) or getting stuck before hitting 100%. There are other reports of the update actually freezing the PC, requiring a hard reset or of an installation failure itself, whereby the update appears to work, but upon rebooting, Windows 11 ends up rolling back the upgrade (with an error) or they get the amazing disappearing Task Bar (which I experienced!).

Website Update

We continue to update and improve the CCCGC website. A new tab was added to provide "Useful Links" where you can find links to the Monthly Favorites, Past Presentations, Software /Tools, and APCUG information. The updated site and its new features can be explored at CCCGC.INFO.

July's Presentation

July's presentation, by Mark Krider, was all about Passkeys. What they are and how they work. Passkeys look like they are going to replace passwords over time. A couple of examples of Passkeys would be facial recognition and fingerprints. We already do a lot of that on our phones. Computers are a little more complicated because many don't have fingerprint readers and most desktops have cameras that may not work with facial recognition. I bought what I thought was a decent webcam for my desktop and found out later that facial recognition won't work with it. Only certain webcams appear to have the specifications to allow facial recognition. Microsoft's system is called Windows Hello. With the right camera, Windows will use facial recognition to log you in. Here's an article about Windows Hello and cameras.

Tech Info

Everything you always wanted to know about hard drives but were afraid to ask.

Hard drives have come a long way over the years. Size, capacity and speed/performance have all changed dramatically. Today, many new computers come with what's called an M.2, NVME drive. The drive is about the size of a stick of gum. They're fast, very fast.

To get a visual idea of how far we've come, here's an article by Urvika Tuteja of Stellar Information Technology discussing the evolution of hard drives.

The NVME drive mentioned earlier, as well as SSD's, are considered flash memory and are in a different category than traditional, mechanical hard drives.

Two comments. First, you should never fill up an SSD. It wears out the drive more quickly. Second, never defrag an SSD. That also wears out an SSD. Solid state drives only get so many read/write cycles. They get a lot but it's not infinite. Filling up an SSD doesn't leave a cushion for future data. Buy a larger drive than you need. It will last a lot longer.

Finally, here's another article by Yasir Mahmood detailing 6 free tools that you can use to gauge the health of your hard drive. Some are more complicated than others.

Windows 11 notification settings you should review

This was in the June 2025 issue of the Bytes. I think it's worth repeating. If you're new to Windows 11 or have never looked at any of these settings, they're worth checking out. It should make for a more pleasant user experience.

Windows 11 comes with many default settings that allow various notifications to show up on your computer. Some are valuable others are simply Microsoft advertisements. Here are some of the notification settings you should review and possibly change. I turn most of them off.

1. Settings/Privacy and Security/General
2. Settings/Privacy and Security/Account Info
3. Settings/System/Notifications - for individual apps - most off
4. Settings/System/Notifications then all the way down to Additional Settings

The last one is the one you need to change to stop Microsoft from advertising on your computer.



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Final Thoughts

When Windows 10 support ends in October of this year, should we be worried? I don't think so. Note that Microsoft has said that support for Windows Defender (antivirus) will continue until at least 2028. That's important.

Microsoft has also said they would continue support for at least an additional year for a price. I believe the amount is \$30 for one year. Several other possibilities have also been proposed to pay for that additional year. One would be to setup OneDrive to backup some of your computer. We'll have to watch this to see what the requirements are. The third possibility mentioned is to use Microsoft Rewards points to pay for a year. My first reaction was that I don't have any points because I don't use Edge or Bing and use only the free OneDrive account. To my surprise, when I checked my Microsoft account I found I had 2200 points. The number I believe I saw was 1000 points per computer. I was shocked. So, go to Microsoft.com. Log into your account. Click on All Microsoft (top right) then Microsoft Rewards and once there, click on Go To The Dashboard to see your points. You might be pleasantly surprised and possibly get a year of free updates.



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APCUG - What is it?

The APCUG is an association of computer and technology user groups. The Charlotte County Computer Group is a member. In turn, as a member of CCCGC, you have access to APCUG benefits. The most obvious are periodic Wednesday and Saturday Zoom calls on various technology and computer related topics.
